Shared Resources -- Arrangements have been made to take and fill reference requests for information from selected resources of the participating libraries. **(TSLAC)** Texas Confederate Pension Applications, Texas city directory information, and Texas Vital Statistics Indexes. **(Genealogy Center, Waco)** McLennan County area obituaries, cemetery records and more. **(Clayton Library Center, Houston)** PERSI periodicals (confirm holdings), microfilm holdings of county records (confirm availability) and Index printout of books from the Clayton Library (www.houstonlibrary.org/catalog) Use the second search option (keyword search in the classic catalog) One surname per request. **(Special Collections Dept., Denton)** city directories, Denton yearbooks (high school, UNT, TWU) and obituaries from the *Denton Record Chronicle* (ID from online indexes at www.dentonlibrary.com) **(Genealogy, Local History... Plano)** Collin County Records include deaths, births, probate, deeds, school census, Plano City Council Minutes, Newspapers (Plano, McKinney and Dallas papers), Native American Books by Jeff Bowen, Collin County cemetery inscriptions and Collin County, Texas families (2 v).

Special Collections staff will be available to assist with research requests and provide assistance.
