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MARCH 2019 MINUTES

McAdams, John, Laura and Victor Pallatto, Heather White, Wanda Yohn. There were 34 members in attendance, including new members Lee Halcom and Audrey Mabe. Eight DAR members were in attendance.

BUSINESS

The Minutes of the February meeting were approved as published in the newsletter. Motion to approve the minutes was made by Walta Evans, seconded by Donna Spears. The Treasurer's Report as published in the newsletter was filed for audit.

OLD BUSINESS

President Spears reminded everyone about the upcoming Family History Discovery Day, Saturday, March 30, which will be held the Family History Center, Denton Stake, 3000 Old North Road, from 9:00 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. Admission is free. Visitor Steve Frederickson explained there will be three blocks of 50-minute classes offered, for both beginner and intermediate level. A Spanish-speaking session is also scheduled. Several genealogy organizations will have booths. Three RootsTech 2019 seminars will be re-broadcasted. LDS consultants will also be available to help attendees with genealogy searches. DCGS members are needed for the Society's booth; please email Joe Spears with the time(s) you can help. Flyers with DCGS information are being printed and will be used as a handout.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

The **GenPen Writers Group** will hold its third meeting Sunday, March 17, 2:00-4:00 p.m. here at the Library. Everyone is welcome to attend. Tonight's speaker, Patti Gillespie, will present **Part 2** of her **Ancestry DNA** program on Saturday, March 16, at 3:00 p.m. No registration necessary. The next Genealogy Meetup will be held on Friday, March 29, 9:30 a.m. Our next meeting will be held Thursday, April 11. Lisa Louise Cooke will present, "How to Save Your Research from Destruction and Ensure Its Future Survival."

PROGRAM

Eric Kaszynski introduced Patti Gillespie, BA, MS, genealogist, owner of "Family Lines and Stories." Ms. Gillespie presented Part 1 of "I've Got My Ancestry DNA Report: What Do I Do Now?" After stressing she was not a geneticist, she summarized the three types of DNA (autosomal, Y, mitochondrial) and clarified the most common terms testers encounter (algorithm, centimorgans, NPE, random recombination, reference population). She then opened the Ancestry DNA web site, demonstrating its features by using her own results. She emphasized that ethnicity profiles are based on a tester's DNA results, but percentages will change as Ancestry's database grows. She cautioned that results found under the "DNA Matches" and "ThruLines" sections are based only on members' trees, not DNA results. She recommended uploading test results to other sites (Family Tree DNA, GEDmatch, etc.) in order to expand the database, but cautioned that privacy issues need to be considered when deciding whether to share. Attendees were given two handouts: "Learning About DNA," and "Why Upload to GEDmatch or Family Tree DNA?"

The meeting was adjourned at 8:30 p.m. Beth Leggieri made the motion; Fran Shurteff seconded.

Loyola University to Create a Database of Loyalist Americans' Claims

Loyalists, the women and men who chose to stay loyal to the British Crown during the American Revolution, have been the subject of a resurgence of scholarly interest over the past decade. Many of the Loyalists moved to Canada as the U.S. Revolutionary War came to a close and a few others moved to England.

Previously dismissed as the losers in the conflict, scholars have turned their attention to those who separated themselves from their friends and neighbors and gave up their land and possessions when they chose to leave the new United States at the end of the American Revolution. The story of that difficult decision recorded in the Loyalist Claims Commission is one that has been largely overlooked since the end of the war.

The Omohundro Institute of Early American History and Culture at the College of William & Mary has

awarded Benjamin Bankhurst, assistant professor of history at Shepherd University, and Kyle Roberts, associate professor of public history and new media and director of the Center for Textual Studies and Digital Humanities at Loyola University Chicago, with a \$5,000 Lapidus Digital Collections Fellowship for "The Maryland Loyalist Project." The project is a collaboration between Bankhurst and Roberts, aiming to make the letters and petitions of British loyalists who fled the American Revolution housed in the British National Archives available in a digital archive.



The Internet Archive has Uploaded 450,000 songs Collected Before Myspace's Massive Data Loss

I have written before learning about the music your ancestors enjoyed. (See <u>https://blog.eogn.com/?</u> <u>s=music</u> for a list of some of my previous articles about music.) Myspace used to be a good source for both old-time and modern music but last month, it became widely known that MySpace has lost much of the user data uploaded to it before 2016, including potentially million of music tracks from between 2003 to 2015. It is estimated that up to 53 million songs from 14 million artists were deleted. Luckily, there is a **free** alternative.



A huge music archive was compiled by "an anonymous academic group who were studying music networks and grabbed 1.3 terabytes of MP3 music files to study from MySpace in roughly 2008 -2010 to do so." After learning about the data loss, the group offered the collection to Archive.org and it is now available to everyone, **free of charge**. This is in addition to the millions of songs already available on <u>Archive.org</u> before this latest contribution.
