

PROGRAM: "Local **Resources for Long Distance Research**"

SPEAKERS: Laura Douglas & Eric Kaszynski

Join us Thursday, September 12 at the Emily Fowler Central Library for the monthly meeting of the DCGS. This month's program will focus on the genealogical resources and services provided by the Denton Public Library and the Denton Family History Center. It doesn't matter if your ancestors lived just around the block or half a world away you can find a plethora of information without leaving town. Both Oklahoma, South Texas, Mexico and the Special Collections Research Area at the Denton Public Library and the Family History Center can provide free access to popular online genealogy services and other internet websites, physical records and staff that can help you in your research. This presentation will provide an overview of the facilities and the services they provide.

Laura Douglas, is the librarian in charge of the Special Collections with the Denton Public Library. Laura has a Bachelor of Science degree in History from Texas Woman's University and

received her Master of Library Science degree from the University of North Texas in 2003. She has worked at Denton Public in various positions for 28 years including children's services, adult services, genealogy and local history. In addition to getting to help other people with their ancestry hunt Laura teaches genealogical research classes at the public library.

Eric B Kaszynski Jr. is the current director of the Family History Center of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints at 3000 Old North Rd. in Denton. Born in Dallas TX in 1950, he grew up in Dallas and Lewisville. Work took him away from the metroplex for a number of years to Kansas. Eric returned to Denton in 1998, infected with the Genealogy bug. Working initially in Personal Ancestral File and then with new.familysearch and for the past several years with FamilySearch Family Tree. He served an 18-month mission for the Church doing telephone support for FamilySearch products in 2014-2015 and has worked as a local volunteer since then. For Eric, Family Tree's collaborative approach makes Family History a family affair.

MAY 2019 MINUTES

President Joe Spears called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. He introduced himself and welcomed everyone. Walta Evans thanked all who brought refreshments. There were 21 members in attendance. No visitors attended.

The Minutes of the April meeting were approved as published in the newsletter. Motion to approve the minutes was made by Walta Evans, seconded by Kathy Butler. President Spears read the Treasurer's Report. It was filed for audit as published in the newsletter.

OLD BUSINESS

Librarian Laura Douglas reported that FamilySearch is not yet ready to index Denton County records. We were waiting to contribute funds from DCGS to the library until a partnership agreement has been signed between the Library and DCGS. The Library will work to start that process this summer. Laura suggested that we can go ahead with the donation of books to the library instead of giving the funds directly. Linda Touraine suggested a fixed amount of \$1500.00. Kathy Butler suggested a percentage of the total funds. Members should email suggestion or specific books and/or computers services directly to the Librarian.

Vice President Eric Kaszynski reported the Society is now paying speakers (average \$85.00/meeting) and suggested keeping that in the budget to enable top-quality programs.

The Board will discuss the issues over the summer and present options to members in September.

NEW BUSINESS

In his "State of the Society" remarks, President Spears noted that membership had grown from 35 to almost 50 in the past year. He congratulated each officer and Board member for a job well done. Board members Chris and Kathy Strauss, who manage the Society newsletter and website, are looking for help. Those interested should contact Chris or Kathy directly.

Members of the new GenPen group reported success, especially at motivating its participants to write, not just research. Members have discovered differing goals and strategies for completing their family histories, but have identified their common pitfalls of fear, trepidation, and perfection.

Laura Douglas announced that the Archives Bazaar, which is being held in Denton in October (it is actually November 2019), is looking for sponsors. The level they are requesting is \$500. It would provide us with a table at the event. The group decided that \$500 was too much. Laura will check to see if there are other levels of sponsorship available.

Eric Kaszynski suggested DCGS host a table at the Bayless-Shelby house during the Denton Community Market. We could staff the booth with volunteers to help attendees with family history searches and promote DCGS.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

President Spears announced annual dues are payable now (\$20 single, \$30 couple). Members Nellyne Heath and Minna

Marinko won the customary drawing of free dues for one year. Upcoming Meetings: GenPen Sunday, May 19, Genealogy Meetup Saturday, May 25, next DCGS Meeting is September 12 (no meetings Jun/Jul/Aug).

PROGRAM

Tonight's meeting was the customary Round Robin discussion, an opportunity for members to share their stories and successes:

Mary Tate presented her hand-lettered family-tree poster, color-coded by country of origin, along with her documentation binder. In addition to confirming British/Scottish royalty in her line, she's discovered former First Lady Barbara Bush and pilot Chesley "Sully" Sullenberger are cousins.

Sandra Robertson reported on her visit to the Texas Heritage Museum at Hill College in Hillsboro, Texas. She found new information on her Civil War ancestor, a GGF from Pennsylvania, in the Museum's extensive collection of Union and Confederate collections.

Kathy Butler passed around a Shutterfly memory book she produced after collecting photos and information from family members at a 2015 reunion.

Bob and Linda Lane discussed issues with DNA and two accounts on Ancestry. Apparently, Ancestry will not activate 2 DNA tests on one account. Linda also reported working on confirming a family link to the former Shah of Iran. Bob reported using his mother's Army commissary card and Google Earth to locate a house he lived in as a child in Germany during WWII—the house is still standing.

Nancy Casey reported on her genealogy road trip to Scranton, Pennsylvania. She has applied for membership to the First Families of Pennsylvania, based on the results of her research.

Walta Evans has discussed a 2nd GGF, a Tory who fled to Canada then later returned to the US. She also announced that a Van Zandt county history is currently on loan from the Family History Library at the Van Zandt library (Walta's mother worked on the project).

Eric Kascynski reported finding a grandfather's death certificate and his WWI discharge papers among a seemingly unimportant stack of his parents' everyday papers. Eric also reported finding a new half-sister through DNA testing.

Donna Spears reported success on a trip to the Tennessee State Library, where she located a 1795 deed for her Smith family. The land, located 3-1/2 miles south of downtown Nashville, was surveyed by a man named Hickman—someone who eventually married into the Smith family. The next planned trip is to Virginia to find another ancestor's record of Revolutionary War service.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:33 p.m., motion by Kathy Butler, seconded by Beth Leggieri.
