

### GAR AND MASONS: DENTON PUBLIC LIBRARY ADDS FRATERNAL ORG BOOKS TO SHELVES

If you had a Civil War ancestor who fought for the Union, there's a chance he was a member of the Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.)—the preeminent Union Army veterans' organization formed at the close of the Civil War.

Developed by Civil War surgeon Benjamin Franklin Stephenson of Springfield, Illinois, the first G.A.R. post was organized and chartered in Decatur, Illinois, on April 6, 1866. Membership reached its peak in 1890, when over 400,000 members were reported. By then the G.A.R. had over seven thousand posts, ranging in size from fewer than two dozen members in small towns, to more than a thousand in some cities.


Author Gary W. Clark brings the history and record sources of the G.A.R. and its auxiliaries to genealogists and family historians in

#### **OUR APRIL PRESENTATION:**

#### "Preservation – From the UNT Archives to Your Family History" (Jodi Rhinehart-Doty & Justin Lemons)

This month's presentation was of special interest for description and examples of their work was both me. My 'day job' is in the Records and Information Management profession, which enables companies and organizations to preserve and access business information over time. This presentation promised to touch on many of the same topics and challenges which I deal with daily. Because of this, I was looking forward to the presentation.

Jodi and Justin supplied a fascinating look into their world at the University of North Texas (UNT) Archives and the work they do preserving rare and unique books, artifacts and other materials. They shared with us their experiences working with several of the Archive collections, including the NBC5/KXAS Television collection and the Patricia Fertel Paper Doll Collection, which included paper dolls from as old as 1865! Of special 'show and tell' interest was a collection of puzzle maps dating from the 1800s. This collection could easily have passed as being made only a few years ago. The

entertaining and enlightening.

Closing out their presentation, they described and reviewed many of the archival techniques, solutions and resources which can be used at home with our own genealogical research and collections. They distributed several handouts providing information on things to consider with our personal and family materials and a graphical handout which allows a quick and easy understanding of what exactly qualifies as "Archival" storage materials and containers.

Both Jodi and Justin are very enthusiastic about their work and should be applauded for their endeavors. Archivists perform the job of ensuring Special Collection artifacts and materials are preserved and accessible for future viewing and research purposes by the public, academic and other types of researchers.
